**WINGRAVE** (with Rowsham), is a parish 6 miles from Aylesbury, and 2 from Marston Gate railway station, in the hundred of Cottesloe, union and county court district of Aylesbury, diocese of Oxford, archdeaconry of Buckingham, and rural deanery of Ivinghoe. The church is dedicated to St. Peter and St. Paul. The living is a vicarage, annual value £150 with residence, in the gift of Earl Brownlow; the Rev. John Molesworth Butt is the vicar. Congregational chapel, Rev. J. Pike, minister. The Primitive Methodists have a chapel. There is a National school for boys and girls; James Wyatt, master; Hannah R. Wyatt, mistress. **WINSLOW-CUM-SHIPTON** is a parish, market, and union town, with a station on the London and North Western Railway, distant 10 miles from Aylesbury, 7 from Buckingham, and 52 from London, in the three hundreds of Cottesloe, county court district of Buckingham, diocese of Oxford, archdeaconry of Buckingham, and rural deanery of Mursley. The church is dedicated to St. Lawrence. The living is a vicarage, annual value £400, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor. The Rev. A. M. Preston is vicar. The Independents, General and Particular Baptists have each a chapel. There is a National school for boys, Mr. Starkins, master, and a parochial school for girls, Miss Vipond, mistress. The acreage is

1,920, of which the chief owners are W. S. Lowndes, Esq. (lord of the manor), E. W. Lowndes, Esq., and D. T. Willis, Esq. The population is 2,000. The market is held every Wednesday for corn, and for cattle the 1st and 3rd Wednesday in every month, and fairs the Wednesday before October 11th, and two following Wednesdays. Petty Sessions are held every alternate Wednesday. The Manor House, a large mansion in this town, was built by the celebrated Indigo Jones.
